
A flat with life and soul







n a process stretching over a number of years, a loft that was previously used for drying laundry has been converted into a very personal home. The Danish photographer and film-maker Erik Zappon grew up in the building, which dates from 1907, and at the age of 14 he moved into a small room in the loft. Later, he gradually converted the entire 4th floor loft into a flat, as the household expanded to include his wife and their children.

At one end of the flat lies a large room with a kitchen, dining area and living room, complete with an open fireplace, custom-built of granite boulders. The other end features a combined office space and living room with exposed beams and studio windows mounted in the ridge of the roof. From the passage area, stairs lead up to a small bed-loft. The time-less Dinesen Douglas planks crate a coherent expression throughout the flat, which only has three doors – for the two bathrooms and for the bedroom.

As the most recent change, Erik Zappon has turned part of the 3rd floor of the building into an office space. Here too, Dinesen floors are used throughout and elegantly tie the different architectural expressions of the two floors together. While the 4th floor has plaster-covered walls and raw ceilings, the 3rd floor has wooden panels and stucco ceilings.














The floor plan has been altered, as two adjacent living rooms have been combined to form one large, bright office space with a meeting table, a library and a modern kitchen.

Erik Zappon's wife works as a design director, and the couple's creative background is evident in the flat. Several photographic artworks by Erik Zappon adorn the walls – including a portrait of the Danish queen from a portrait series of artists. The knight's armour in the combined office and living room comes from a feature film that the couple did together. The collage in the office consists of found objects, heirlooms and paintings by Erik Zappon's wife and their children.

The couple has a shared penchant for Le Corbusier, and in addition the flat is furnished with designer furniture from Fritz Hansen, Kartell, Zanotta and others.










